



Mapping a Cruise

When Lion Amy promoted a cruise for the upcoming LCI convention that relocated to Orlando from Mexico City, I was able to check **cruisemapper.com** to find out what the ports of call would be and what the ship had to offer in amenities before Lion Amy gave more information about the cruise. Earlier this year, I got hooked on watching live streams of the Port of Miami cruise traffic. I would see these boats and wonder what they were and what their itineraries were, so I went searching for a website that could tell me. I've found that cruisemapper.com, which also has a mobile app, gives lots of details on ports of call, times of arrival and departure, and lots of good details on the ships, like how many passengers and decks and what kind of rooms and amenities are available. When my brother and his family took a Mediterranean cruise this summer from Barcelona to Italy and France and a few islands in between, I was able to

track my brother's journey in real time. When I watch the live webcam of SF that Mersea restaurant on Treasure Island has and I can see that there is a cruise ship coming into SF port, I can use **cruisemapper.com** to see where that boat is coming from, where it's going, and how many are on board and all kinds of details about the trip and boat. You can search by ports of call and cruise lines. It's a fascinating app or website to track and research cruises that you or your family and friends are taking or want to take. After you do your research on the site, you can contact Lion Amy to get you a good experience, or your personal travel agent if you have one. If you'd like to know what those other ships are in the bay and ocean, check out vesselfinder.com. There are other good sites for general marine traffic, but I haven't found a site that is better than **cruisemapper** for cruises. Vesselfinder is easy to use and free for basic info. Cruisemapper is free, too.

Happy Holidays from the California Lions Foundation!

We are coming into a brand-new year, 2025. Still a relatively young foundation, CLF has been awarding grants to California Lions clubs for 5 years now, since January 2020. The very first grant went to the San Francisco Host Lions Club for a vision screening machine.

Although the size of our grants hasn't grown yet, due to our relatively small size, the number of grants awarded continues to grow. During the 2023-24 Lions year, over \$55,000 in grants were awarded to 13 districts in Multiple District 4. An additional \$42,940 was sent to Maui, a result of a special appeal. Of the \$55,000 awarded in California, \$10,999 went to District 4-C4.

Help CLF continue to award grants to worthy California projects by donating to the foundation.

The more that you help us grow, the more we can continue to help our clubs do good work.

Preparing for a Tsunami ... By: Newsletter Editor

Per DG Lion Clayton's focus on Disaster Preparedness, we'll be sharing charities and disaster preparedness resources for this series. As our area faced a tsunami threat in December, our topic this month is tsunami preparation.

When an earthquake took place 60 miles off shore in Northern California on December 5, millions in the SF Bay Area got alerts on their phones that a tsunami was possible. The warning advised people to move away from the coast line or water shores to higher ground and stay out of the ocean. BART closed the transbay tube under the bay and Alcatraz tour boats halted service. Some schools on the coast asked for evacuation of their students. Anxiety got high as people started watching the shores in anticipation of the pending tidal wave. Only it never came. The warning was called off about the time it was expected to reach the bay area and San Mateo County coast. It was even later revealed in one media source that the kind of earthquake that took place would not create a tsunami, so people in the Bay Area were panicked for no reason. I lived in the Bay Area most of my life and California all of my life. I never heard that there are "kinds" of earthquakes! It turns out that a tsunami risk depends on the kind of fault that the earthquake takes place on. If it's a subduction fault, it can cause a tsunami if the earthquake is powerful enough. If it is a slip-shake fault, like the San Andreas Fault that runs through the SF peninsula, it would not create a tsunami. These two kinds of faults move the earth plates differently, thus one would effect water movement while the other doesn't. Fortunately, our area doesn't have that fault type to create a big tsunami. Per an article in LAist.com, even if a tsunami came into the Golden Gate strait, the saturation points are more for the SF coast and the likelihood it would reach beyond the SF Bay Bridge or into the east Bay coastline is minimal.

When the warning came in, it sounded like everyone was at risk. Thus, we may be wondering how to prepare for a tsunami. **Ready.Gov advises to:**

- Map our your routes from home, work, and play.
- Pick shelters 100 feet or more above sea level or at least one mile inland.
- Create a family emergency communication plan that has an out of state contact.
- Plan where to meet if you get separated.

Per Google AI search: If you are on a **boat**, **head out to sea** when a tsunami warning is issued **Never try to outrun** a tsunami by **driving**; **evacuate on foot** if possible. As waves are travelling over 100 MPH and snagging debris along the way, **even small waves can be potentially dangerous**.

Greeting Fellow Lions from Region One!

We dearly miss our Region Chair, Lion Connie Bridgewater, whose legacy continues to inspire us. Zone Chairs Lion Calvin Yee and Lion Carol Fung have stepped it up by sharing responsibilities in supporting Region 1 clubs and forging forward.

On December 7, 2024, our region held the Connie Bridgewater Hunger Project at City Eats headquarters in San Francisco. This annual evening event, held on the first Saturday of December, brought together six Lions from various clubs across the district alongside other community volunteers.

Lions contributed by sorting clothing, assembling meals, and preparing beverage snack packs. Over 50 people worked indoors assembling meals while 25+ handled outdoor food distribution and crowd control. Thanks to these combined efforts, over 800 meals were distributed to those in need.

The SF Host Lions inducted three new members during the District Governor's visitation, attended by District Governor Lion Clayton Jolley, 1VDG Lion Cindy Zeng, and Region 1 Zone 1 Chair Lion Calvin Yee. The club continues its impactful work, including health fairs and preparations for another medical mission to the Philippines. The SF Keystone Lions Club organized a fundraiser for victims of Hurricane Helene in Cupertino, demonstrating their commitment to global disaster relief efforts.

The San Francisco Unified Lions Club has enhanced its youth vision screening project by purchasing its first vision screener, which was made possible through a matching donation from the California Lions Foundation. Their ongoing service efforts include:

Serving lunch to seniors on Thanksgiving Day at the Self Help for the Elderly.

Co-hosting an Annual Toy Drive to support local youth organizations in San Francisco.

Sponsoring Wreaths Across America initiative, laying wreaths at the Presidio Military Cemetery on December 14, 2024.

The innovative Silicon Valley Cyber Lions Club launched their "A Taste of Peace" wine to support the Peace Poster Exhibition in California, offering red and white wines for sale by the case. (See flyer on page 18.) Their recent service projects include:

Collaborating with FC Bair Island Cyber to donate 217 pairs of black socks for the Toasty Toes Project.

Donating 1,800 three-layer respirator masks to SF Host Lions for their medical mission in the Philippines.

Providing 43 junior high school backpacks and 34 elementary school backpacks to BAGO Lions for their mission work.

Other Region 1 clubs are actively engaged in service projects and fundraisers, though some were unable to submit their reports by the deadline.

Thank you to all the Lions of Region 1 for your dedication to serving our communities and making a difference in the lives of others.





