# **BREAST CANCER STAMP CAN SAVE LIVES!**

It would be wonderful if 2005 were the year that a cure for Breast Cancer was found!!!! This is one item you should be glad to pass on. The notion that we could raise \$35 million by buying a book of stamps is powerful! We are all constantly stretching our dollars but buying stamps is something you do every month, sometimes more than once. What if part of that purchase ended up being the one to help save a life?

As you may be aware, the US Postal Service recently released its new "Fund the Cure" stamp to help fund breast cancer research. The stamp was designed by Ethel Kessler of Bethesda, Maryland. It is important that we take a stand against this disease that affects so many of our mothers, sisters and friends. Men get breast cancer as well.

Instead of the routine 37 cents for a stamp, this one cost 40 cents. The additional 3 cents will go to breast cancer research. A "normal" book costs \$7.40. This one is only \$8.00. It takes a few minutes in line at the Post Office and means so much. If all stamps are sold, it will raise an additional \$35,000,000 for this vital research.

Just as important as the money is our support. What a statement it would make if the stamp outsold the lottery this week. What a statement it would make that we care. I would urge you to do two things TODAY:

- 1. Go out and purchase some of these stamps.
- 2. E-mail and send a note to your friends to do the same. We all know women and their

families whose lives are turned upside-down by breast cancer. It takes so little to do so much in this drive. I think we can all afford the additional 60 cents the new book costs.

Please help by passing this on and fighting to help end Breast Cancer by funding the cure, one stamp at a time.

#### IN MEMORY OF JOHN ANTHONY DE SANTOS NOV. 9, 1913-FEB.27, 2005

At 91, John De Santo passed away of natural causes at his home in Lake Havana City, Az.

Lion John began in New York Hyde Park Lion where he also served as Mayor and organized the city's first Little League baseball team (20 years +) then transferred to Foster City Lions in 1979 where he was active for about 13 years or more. He was, among other things, Foster City Lion of the Year, and Foster City Citizen of the Year (1986) and a veteran of Christmas Tree Sales in both New York Hyde Park Lions Club and in Foster City Lions Club.


Perhaps what Lion John claimed as his favorite part of Lionism was working with children. He started an eye care program that is known to have assisted over 200 children with exams and glasses that could not have afforded them. The improvement this brought to their young lives and their future is the heart of Lionism.

Lion John was the recipient of a Life Membership in Lions International and a Melvin Jones Fellowship, the most prestigious award a Lions Club gives a member for outstanding service.

He is survived by his wife Rosalia, and her children, and his daughter Sharon Ma and her husband, Ron, of Foster City and his son John Jr, and daughter in law Margaret of Allentown, Pennsylvania, and their families.

Celebration of his life was held on March

#### SOCIAL SECURITY—PERHAPS WE ARE ASKING THE WRONG QUESTIONS!

Perhaps we are asking the wrong questions during election years.

Our Senators and Congresswomen do not pay into Social Security and, of course, they do not collect from it. You see, Social Security benefits were not suitable for persons of their rare elevation in society. They felt they should have a special plan for themselves.

So, many years ago they voted in their own benefit plan. In more recent years, no congressperson has felt the need to change it. After all, it is a great plan. For all practical purposes their plan works like this: When they retire, they continue to draw the same pay until they die. Except it may increase from time to time for cost of living adjustments. This is calculated on an average life span for each of those two Dignitaries. For example, Senator Byrd and Congressman White and their wives may expect to draw \$7,800,000.00 (that's Seven Mil-

lion, Eight-Hundred Thousand Dollars), with their wives drawing \$275,000.00 during the last years of their lives. Younger Dignitaries who retire at an early age will receive much more during the rest of their lives. Their cost for this excellent plan is:

\$0.00....NADA.....ZILCH.....

From our own Social Security Plan, which you and I pay (or have paid) into every payday until we retire (which amount is matched by our employer), we can expect to get an average of \$1,000 per month after retirement. Or, in other words, we would have to collect our average of \$1,000 monthly benefits for 68 years and one (1) month to equal Senator Bill Bradley's benefits! Social Security could be very good if only one small

change were made. That change would be to Jerk the Golden Fleece Retirement Plan from under the Senators and Congressmen.

Put them into the Social Security plan with the rest of us. Then sit back and watch how fast they would fix it.

If enough people receive this, maybe a seed of awareness will be planted and maybe good changes will evolve.

This might be a real issue for the 2008 election as it has been constant issue to IMPROVE Social Security by taking it into the private sector and opening it up for investment purposes. This will put the future of many elderly people at risk though, as you can see, it will not affect the future security of those leaders who will be voting to do this.

For many people in the world, on this side of the Hemisphere, May 5th is known as Cinco de Mayo and is a cause for Celebration and remembers a day of freedom. It began in this country in Denver to give color and courage to the Chicano Movement and has taken on a cultural life of its own. May 5th commemorates a Mexican battle between 4500 mostly Mexican Indians led by a Texas Mexican General in 1862 against 7000 Imperial French troops sent by Napoleon III. Mexican President Benito Juarez used the victory as a symbol of the nations ability and strength to defeat an invading army and to rally Mexican's of all persuasions in defending their country and keeping it free.

However, May 5th is also another kind of remembrance day for millions of the worlds population. To many it is known as Yom HaShoah is the Holocaust Memorial Day of Israel and the Jewish People. This year we remember not only the heroism and martyrdom of the Jewish People in Europe during the dark years of 1939 - 1945, but we also give pause to reflect on the commemoration of the 60th anniversary of the end of World War II and the liberation of the death camps by the Allies.
