
passed too quickly – how do you think DG Emil is feeling about now? Yes, and yours' truly is sweating bullets, trying desperately to be prepared for next year.

Daly City Host Lions Flag Day Program for 2009

The Daly City Host Lions Club presented their 2009 Flag Day Program to 18 schools in their community. Next year, in 2010, the final school, (Skyline Elementary) in the area will be added to the program. This year, more then 2,000 flags and brochures were distributed to the children in the 3rd and 5th grades in 18 schools.

The DCHL Club's Flag Day Program has been an unqualified success for over 14 years, serving the children in our community. Daly City and its surrounding area enjoy a diverse ethnic community. Many of the students are either 1st generation American or their parents are. That being said, it is important to give these children an introduction of our history and tradition.

The premise is simple. The classes gather in the multi-purpose room in their school for a 45 minute presentation by one of the Lions present. The children are told of the history of the American Flag and an explanation of the "Stars, Stripes, and Colors," of the Flag, as well as the many changes to the Flag over the years. There are pictures shown of places where the Flag flies, including our Capital, Fort McHenry, and the Moon. The VFW joins in the presentation with a ceremonial folding of the Flag. The VFW talks about the symbolism of the folds and the funeral presentation ceremony to the family of veterans. The presenting Lion then gives a further talk on the meaning and importance of respecting our Flag. This is followed by a question and answer period.

The program is always well received and appreciated. When the Introducing Lion first begins to speak, the children are a little restless and noisy. Within a very few minutes, they are captured by the information they hear and are quiet and waiting for more details. Usually, 3 or 4 Lions are necessary to put on this program. An Introduction Lion, A presenter Lion, and 1 or 2 Lions to distribute the flags to the teachers are the only needed help. As an aside, we found that it was best that the teachers be given the flags. They distribute the flags at the end of the school day to the children to take home.

The DCHL Club is willing to advise and help any other club wishing to learn more about this wonderfully successful program.

From LCI International: March is Eye Donor Awareness Month



Lions eye banks perform valuable sight-saving functions. A staff of professionals at the eye bank recover, evaluate and distribute human eye tissue for vision restoration, research and education. Eye surgeons rely on eye banks to supply them with eye tissue for sight-saving procedures for

persons who have eye disease or injury.

Lions have been providing support for eye banks for nearly 65 years. Currently, there are 53 official Lions Eye Banks throughout the world.

Organ Donor Education - California State Senate Bill SB 552:

4-C4 Newsletter received a letter from Lion Sandy Jeghers, Vice President of the Northwest Lions Foundation for Sight and Hearing, as follows (shortened)...

"We are requesting your help to obtain passage of an important piece of legislation being considered by the California State Senate (SB 552). This legislation would require our high school students to be educated regarding the importance of organ and tissue donation. There are no cost or tax implications and the materials are provided free by Donate Life California.

"Lions across the globe have had a clear goal to help with the gift of sight. As you may know, Lions Eye Banks across the country, as well as those in California, rely on our population to donate their corneal tissue upon their passing. Every individual will make a personal choice as whether or not they wish to be a tissue or organ donor. This law simply allows them the opportunity to be educated on the options."
