HABITAT FOR HUMANITY REPORT BY LION JIM BIGELOW

All Lions in 4-C4:

The Peninsula Habitat seven home developments are now underway on Third Avenue in Daly City. We appreciate the \$5,550 contributed by the Clubs of our District at the beginning of this project for the "Wheel Chair Accessible" five member Laguinadum Family townhome. This project began under PDG Jocelyn Mina and will be completed for home occupancy by the end of our current DG Ray Rosenthal Lion's year. Our donated funds have been used to help pay for the cement foundation. We had hoped to have other City area also contribute however the pating on stage when the Habitat Lions carried the day.

The Laquinadum townhome needed an additional \$150.000 to complete the improvements above the foundation. SO YOU WANT TO BE IN THE LION MAGAZINE?

There are some very basic steps to getting an article in the Lion Magazine. Luck is one.

First, do not be in a hurry. It often takes 3 months or more for an article or parts of it to be approved and processed and go through the many steps it takes to get into this large and special magazine.

Submit detailed descriptions of service projects and fundraising activities. Why is you club doing this event? What is the event? Make it interesting! Tell them how much money was raised and for what purpose.

Please, include clear photographs of Lions participating in the project but not grinning at the camera and posing. Lions doing what they are supposed to be doing is really best. Please do not staple or write on the photo, it can ruin it for further use. Put a small sticky on the back with a number or letter that corresponds to the same number or letter on a sheet of paper that identifies the people in photograph, what is happening, and when it is happening. A CD backup of the photos is even better.

Do include the name, address, and daytime phone number of the contact person for the article.

Do not submit club anniversary's or birthdays of members or social events.

Lions World Sight Day was created to spotlight the importance of eradicating preventable blindness and improving sight, An increasing number of Lions clubs are using this occasion to collect eyeglasses, conduct vision and diabetes screenings and plan educational programs to inform their communities about the importance of sight and diseases such as diabetes that can impact sight.

There are many resources available to the clubs through Lions International to help plan for World sight Day.

Also, don't forget that Halloween or some time near it is a great time to collect glasses for Sight Night. You can get free door hangers, if you hurry or at least a master to make some, distribute them and say when you'll be back to pick up the old eyeglasses. People really respond to this. Take the sunglasses as well and give them to a local blind center.

Take pictures and write it up. You might be in next years issue of The Lion regarding World Sight Day. Sometimes that is how it works.

ing the lifestyles and cultures of others, the first steps in planting the seeds of global harmony and good will.

Children who are at greatest risk, and they number in the millions, must be of special concern to Lions. Those who are homeless and whom we refer to as "street children" are, of course, obvious components of this human tragedy. But in every community in which there are children who live under conditions that call for the attention of people such as the Lions who are committed to offering the hand of care and assistance. Poverty, abuse, drugs, disease and disabilities affect chil-

dren everywhere and, although Lions, or any one group, cannot respond to all these problems, as an international organization with community roots we can respond effectively through local initiatives and cooperation with other organizations on a world scale. We are doing so in our cooperative alliance with Special Olympics, and our relationship with UNICEF in providing the "School-in-a Box" kits is addressing the education needs of youngsters whose schooling has been disrupted by wars and other incidents.

I ask that every Lions club in our association take an active part in our new Lions Service for Children Program, which is designed to provide health and education services for youth who live in adverse circumstances. A club must first determine the crucial needs of children in its community and then put into place the resources to answer them. No matter the condition Lions choose to target, however, they must always be willing to join in partnership with organizations that have similar commitments in assisting young people.

This year, I will recognize Lions clubs that organize or ex-

Impromptu Speech by Leo Kelby Peeler, Sept 18, 2004, Leadership Training Session

I did not have to ponder on the subject, nor did I have to observe behavior to understand the compatibility of each and every one of the people in the room. So without further ado. I would like to say that I have realized they are all leaders. The governor, I have seen, mingles his was in the crowd as if he were one of them. And to say the truth he is one of them. He is not dressed in the attire of the stereotypical governor.

We are the ants and on our views he is yet another helper who carries the pieces of the puzzle of life on his back. I no-

ticed when I first came in-- new to the atmosphere, new to the people--I had no idea of what his title was. This, I guess, portrays him not as an individual leader who leads us, but rather he is a leader who encourages us to lead him. Leaders, I believe, must become the people; he must fuse himself within their hearts: absorb himself in their minds; and allow them to see him as a part of one united soul, the entity of our progression of carrying the pieces of life to the mound of unity and inspiration.

Before I finish, I would have to say that theses meetings--the meetings of the Lion's Club-- are a plethora of leadership, and that is rare. Maybe not to the adult, but to a teenagers' world. I do not see it very often, so this was very inspirational.

I quote: we cannot lead with one mind, but with an army of hearts we can accomplish the deeds of compassionate gods.
