<u>Sunday Farmers Market Update</u> Jitze Couperus who has been with our Sunday Farmers Market from the beginning took a recent fall and broke his ankle and after being hospitalized his back was also injured in his fall. He has had two surgeries,

one the ankle and the other on his back. He is at Sequoia Hospital in Redwood City and is recovering. Jitze and wife Nancy help out to get the Sunday Farmers Market open and have done so for many, many years. We wish Jitze a quick recovery and he is missed at our Sunday Farmers Market. Jitze has been working with Lori Hennings, our Market Manager and each Sunday they collect the space rentals from our vendors and Jitze has been depositing the proceeds each Sunday in the Bank night drop. John Hickson has been working with Lori on alternatives so that the deposits are made. Spring is just around the corner and the farmers indicate new crops are being planted and more produce will be available by May. The Farmers Market is doing well and entertainment by the Big Oak Tree is a plus for the public while shopping on Sundays. Margaret Carney does a very good job lining up the various musical groups.

<u>ICARE Committee Update</u> Co-Chairs Bobbie McDonald and Tina Morris continue to be very busy with the ICARE Vision Screening Committee. They have recently added six more schools to be serviced with the vision screening. Now that the Club has two SPOT Vision Screening machines one can back up the other and it allows more capability to provide vision-screening services. At the February Board meeting it was reported that LensCrafters is still honoring the special vouchers for glasses of which our Club has about eight and EyeExam of California is doing the eye exams at the LensCrafters Offices for \$75.00. As ICARE does referrals there are some needy children that need glasses and follow up eye exams. Our Club currently has about \$3,000 in our current sight budget that can be used to sponsor needy children or adults for glasses and eye exams.

<u>Club Treasurer</u> Priscilla Robertson, current Club Treasurer has indicated she will move on at the end of our Fiscal Year and will be replaced by an ICARE Vision Screening Committee member. Priscilla is and continues to do an outstanding job as our Club Treasurer. She will be completing our scheduled donations in accordance with our Board approved Community Giving Budget.

<u>Peninsula Council of Lions 54th Annual Police and Fire Awards Banquet</u> Our Club is making the final arrangements with the Atherton and Menlo Park Police Departments including the Menlo Park Fire Protection District. The Awards Banquet is coming up very soon on Friday, March 15th at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Foster City.
