ICARE 50th Anniversary!

It is a pleasure for us to celebrate the public service of ICARE Vision Screening who in prior years was founded in 1969 by Dr. Jerome Bettman who was formerly the head of Stanford's Ophthalmology Department. At the time Dr. Bettman was President of the Northern California Society for the Prevention of Blindness (NCSPB). On September 19, 1969 Dr. Bettman's daughter Jean Rossiter and her friend Logue Malouf set up the Society auxiliary ICARE.

The members of the auxiliary were women who would raise funds and carry on its amblyopia and glaucoma screening programs of the Society. Their original effort was working with women's editors to increase awareness in the prevention of blindness, expand home screenings, make presentations to PTA groups and to raise funds for the Society. These women reached out to welfare departments and the Red Cross establishing a list of nursery schools and children's day care centers for future use in vision screenings of young children. In 1970 the Society drafted bylaws and the name ICARE for their group.

In December 1969 the first vision screening was conducted at Booker T. Washington School in San Francisco for 45 children. In January 1970 the first glaucoma clinic was held at Little House in Menlo Park. By 1972 ICARE had expanded to include one group in San Francisco and two on the Peninsula. A variety of fundraisers were being held such as gourmet dinner/luncheon raffles flea markets, puppet shows, teas, Christmas party at Menlo Country Club and many more. Also by 1972 ICARE had grown to 34 members and they were screening about 400 children annually.

NCSPB in 1973 decided that the funds raised by ICARE should not go into the NCSPB General Fund but should stay with ICARE to support their programs, as they desired. By 1977 ICARE had accumulated \$10,000. In December of 1977 ICARE made funds available for Registered Nurses to participate in a course on children's vision providing continuing education credits and a fellowship at Stanford Medical Center in the Division of Ophthalmology in the amount of \$1,500 annually. From 1997 to 2015 ICARE continued to screen children as an auxiliary of

PBNC (Prevention of Blindness Northern California) growing the number of preschools and children screened. Finding venues on weekends and residents to participate the glaucoma screenings were stopped in 2012 possibly due to better healthcare. Screenings had decreased and fundraising ended after Stanford and PBNC no longer needed their funds. In 2015 PBNC terminated their relationship with all their volunteer screening groups including ICARE with them taking the screening over themselves.

In 2016 the ICARE was looking for an opportunity to continue vision screenings of preschool and young school children. In working with Lions Club President John Hickson and checking out the Menlo Park Live Oak Lions Club, ICARE found the Lions two highest priorities were sight and hearing assistance to the needy. Also Lions Clubs International (LCI) had chartered the Menlo Park Live Oak Lions Club as well as over 40,000 Lions Clubs domestically and around the world. They were informed that Lions District 4-C4 had available on a scheduling basis, Vision Screening equipment for use by Clubs. This new equipment was state of the art, fast and provided detailed information on the vision of children, adults and seniors quickly. Lion's activities were also covered by insurance (LCI).

In May 2016 a number of the former ICARE members joined the Menlo Park Live Oak Lions and they were trained by Lions District 4-C4 officials on how to use the Vision Screening equipment. The newly formed Club ICARE Vision Screening Committee then used the SPOT Vision Screening equipment for local area Children's Centers and Schools. They quickly became more active and scheduled more and more vision screenings.

The Club ICARE Vision Screening Committee then found the Menlo Park Live Oak Lions Club has a Sunday Farmers Market and it's a fundraiser for the local Lions Club community giving and support of Lions activities including funds in reserve. ICARE was informed that vision screening activities could be funded out of Club fundraising. As scheduling of District vision screening equipment became more challenging with additional Lions Clubs getting involved in the growing demands of their local communities and a fixed number of Vision Screening equipment available, it was decided by our Lions Club Board in November 2017 that we order our own SPOT Vision Screener and related equipment for \$7,762.87.

Bobbie McDonald and Tina Morris, Co-Chairs at the next Club ICARE Committee meeting informed the Committee of the Club Board action and encouraged Committee members if they wanted to donate to offset the Club expense it would be welcome. Well the Committee members donated \$6,910.00!!!!! What a gift from the Committee members and it shows in the Club ICARE Committee SPOT Vision Screenings for Fiscal 2017 were 881 with 69 referrals, Fiscal 2018 were 1,087 with 72 referrals and Fiscal 2019 1,550 and 120 referrals. In January of 2019 the Club Board allocated from the Hennings Trust Funds given to our Club in December 2018 the sum of \$8,100.00 to purchase a second SPOT Vision Screening machine and accessories that will allow our Club to meet local vision screening demands.

As we now are coming up on the 50th Anniversary of ICARE, the vision screening with the two Club SPOT machines and the Club ICARE Vision Screening Committee's support from our Lions Club has moved this effort of our 27 women members on this Committee to a new level. Under the Club Committee Co-Chairs Bobbie McDonald and Tina Morris the Menlo Park Lions Club is poised to expand our community vision screening to new levels. Our Lions partnership in this effort is an outstanding achievement. The Club ICARE Committee can provide for eye exams and glasses through our partnership with LensCrafters and EyExam of California for those in need who cannot afford the needed sight services through SPOT vision screening or local Agency referrals. In our Club Community Giving Budget we have additional funding for eye exam and glasses. ICARE can help children, adults and seniors. Happy 50th Anniversary!

Club Sunday Farmers Market in downtown Menlo Park For the month of August we had five Sundays and the amount of donated produce was about 7,000 pounds. It is anticipated that September and October will remain high with 1,200 to 1,500 per Sunday going to the needy. We continue to support St. Vincent de Paul at Half Moon Bay and East Palo Alto. With larger Sunday donated produce from our farmers we also provide produce to St. Anthony's in Menlo Park. When the rains begin and the frost arrives at the farm fields then our donations will drop significantly, however a number of fall and winter crops thrive on that weather and that is why we have a year round Farmers Market. Many thanks to Paul Tarantino and Karl Jeager who coordinate the Sunday donated produce pickup. Thanks also to Club members and Club ICARE Committee members who help out.

After discussion the Club Board approved our Fiscal 2020 Budget (7/1/19 – 6/30/20) in the amount of \$36,110.00. The Club does have substantial reserve funds so if additional funding requests come in the Board can consider and act on those requests. As this issue reaches you we need to inform you that Priscilla Robertson, Club Treasurer will need to step down from this position due to pressing personal matters. We need to acknowledge her efforts to computerize our financial accounting and the outstanding job she has done for our Club. Club President John Hickson and Priscilla have been searching for and interviewing book keeping services that our Club is planning on retaining to continue the up keep of our financial records. Club President John is also looking to fill the Club Treasurer position in the near future. As we begin the new Fiscal Year our income from the Sunday Farmers Market is comparable to our last Fiscal Year and appears to be strong.

District Rise Against Hunger volunteer opportunity, Sunday, November 17th Club members have asked about the volunteer opportunities on the quarterly Rise Against Hunger activity. The next opportunity will be at Skylawn Funeral Home & Memorial Park at Highway 92 at Skyline Boulevard in San Mateo. The District 4-C4 activity is open to all Lions and Non-Lions. Lunch will be provided and the activity begins at 9:00 am and runs to 12 noon.
