

Helen Keller Day, June 27, 2022

The Lions Club: "Knights of the Blind" In 1971, the Directors of Lions Clubs International designated June 1 as Helen Keller day. In 2006, a Presidential Proclamation was made proclaiming June 27th, Helen Keller day. This date coincides with her birthday, which was on June 27, 1880. This differs from the day that the Lions designated, so you can choose whichever day to celebrate her legacy.

Helen Keller spoke at the 1925 Lions International Foundation Convention. She asked the Lions Club to work with and support The American Foundation for the Blind, a four year old organization that dealt with people who were severely visually impaired. She spoke of the long hours of work and training that went into lifting the darkness of blindness, which enabled her to graduate with honors from Radcliffe in 1904, making her the first blind and deaf woman to graduate from college.

She went on to speak on the work performed by the American Foundation for the Blind. How they worked with the blind, to help them overcome their disability, and help them "triumph over blindness".

This is how she closed her speech to the Lions:

"If you care, if we can make the people of this great country care, the blind will triumph over blindness. This is the opportunity I offer you, Lions—to foster and sponsor the work of the American Foundation for the Blind. Will you not help me hasten the day when there shall be no preventable blindness, no little deaf blind child untaught, no blind man or woman unaided? I appeal to you, Lions—you who have your sight, your hearing, you who are strong and brave and kind—will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in my crusade against darkness?"

The Lions accepted the challenge, and became Knights of the Blind.


After conquering her challenges, Helen Keller became a noted motivational speaker. Here are some of her proverbs.

# 93 years of Service to the City of Burlingame

On June 27, 1929, the Burlingame/San Mateo Lions Club was organized, with a Charter membership of 20 new Lions. In time, the Club grew large enough that it was decided to split the Club into two Clubs: the Burlingame Lions Club, and the San Mateo Host Lions Club. It was felt that both communities would be better served with their own individual Lions Club. This year marks the 93rd year of support for the City of Burlingame, and those years have been filled with wonderful members from all walks of life and experiences. There were countless projects and programs that have come and gone through the years. These projects ranged from Community service projects, to programs that comradery amongst our members. This Club has a rich and long history, and it is the responsibility of each, and everyone, of our members to insure its continued growth and existence.

HISTORY OF BURLINGAME LIONS CLUB (brief)

Founded 1927 - Originally part of San Mateo Club but split off in 1927 to be the Burlingame Lions Club

Not many of original members left a. Bill Jenkins - first president Ed Hevey, B.B. Stern,

The orginal charter is on the front wall at the club showing the names of charter members.

Lions International keeps a record of each and every Lion and the date he waxx joined his club and who his sponsorer was. These records are in 6ak Brook, Ill.

Our Club has been very active over the years - Some of the projects are as follows:

- 2. We sponsored a Rifle range at the foot of Broadway where we taught youngsters how to shoot Had Turkey Shoots etc.
  This was also used By the the various Police Departments for Officer training also for the Sheriff's Department
  When the County established their own range at Coystef Point ours was dismantled I recall we had about \$10,000. big \$ invested here.
- 2. We sponsored a Sea Scout Ship which was moored at Coyote Point Harbur This worked fine for a while but shon turned into a bobtomless hole into which we were putting our hard earned funds. So we dropped this I recall we put in a figure like \$13,000.
- 3. Our Burlingame Lions Mini Parks were built on city owned lands around different neighborhoods. One on Carolyn near Morrel another on the Corner of Trenton and Rollins another on the corner of Paloma and Edgehill Burlingame
  - -- These children's parks have a sign saying "another Lions Project" (Consist of Swings, sand boxes, etc enclosed with a fence. They are maintained by the City.
- 4. We built a Bocci Ball Count in Walning ton Park
- 5. We built the "Jack Charnow" outdown stage and amphitheater at Hoover School. Blood Bank
- We supplied Peninsula Makkiaki with the first blood freezer on the peninsula - about 5 years ago at at cost of \$5,000.00
- Our club is a member of the Lions Eye Foundation at the Pacific Medidal Gtr in S.F. to the tune of about \$600. per year.

8. Fator egg Hute - Musters Taipi

For Fund Raisers- We have our July 4th Fireworks stands (\$5,000.) - our Y & CA Raffle Ticket sales (\$5,000.), White Cane Project (\$2,000.) and our ST.Patrick Day Community Dinner (\$2,000.)

District Governors - We have had more than any other club in our district (6 now) and we are looked up to as one of the strongest Clubs in the Dist.

New member orientation meeting at Lion Art Preston's house about **40 years** ago. Here are notes from the Lion....maybe Art, regarding the history of the Club.

- 1. Sponsored rifle range on Broadway
- 2. Tried to sponsor a Sea Scout Ship
- 3. Mini parks were built: Tot-Lots
- 4. Fundraisers: fireworks, White cane, Y&CA tickets, St Pats
- 5. We built a bocce ball court at Washington Park

Our Club Banner was presented to Clubs during visitations. In turn, we received one from Clubs visiting us. For many years, these were displayed high up on the walls of the Hall.
