MERLO Team Inspires 4-C4 Clubs with Increased Membership

As the Vice District Governor, one of my most rewarding jobs is to chair the MERLO team. I thought that you would like to know what the MERLO team has accomplished for the first six months and what we are planning for the balance of the year.

The leadership Chair Lion Ken Ibarra and Co-Chair Lion Paul Cademartori put on a Club Officer Orientation in June and a follow-up class in July. The class went over the duties and responsibilities of the club offices and provided valuable insight for club officers. Over half of the presidents and secretaries of the District attended the class.

The Orientation Chair PDG Mel Phillips presented a Membership Orientation class in September. The class was for providing club membership chairs tips on orientating new members.

We have been asked to help several clubs that are having problems with membership or organizing. Several Lions have stepped up and helped reorganize the clubs and the results have been slow but steady. The procedure for helping a club has been that the Zone Chair and Region Chair are asked for help from the Club. The MERLO team then gets involved in assisting the club. We will continue to work with clubs that are having problems and that would like our assistance.



We are in the process of building two new Lions Clubs in the District. Neither area is currently being served by another Lions Club. The First area is the Fair Oaks area next to Redwood City. Extension Chair PDG Al Russell has stated that they currently have 18 individuals that

would like to become part of the Lions family. The Fair Oaks Lions Club will be chartered in March or April of this year. The second club is in the Civic Center Area of San Francisco. Extension Chair Helen Olsen is holding the first orientation meeting on February 7th. It is hoped that the San Francisco City Hall Lions Club will be chartered by June of this year. If any Lion knows of anyone that either works or lives in the two areas, please let Lions PDG Al Russell or Lion Helen Olsen know.

We will also have a Healthy Club Workshop on March 15th. The workshop will be at the Burlingame Lions Hall and will be led by the MD4 Leadership Team. All are encouraged to attend this workshop but please RSVP as space is limited and we need to know who is coming so we have sufficient materials. Please call VDG Emil Kantola if you would like to attend. We will also be having a Club Officer Orientation in June, a new Membership/Retention Class in September and a Membership Orientation Class in October.

Why PR (Public Relations) Helps your Club



Each of our clubs is different, yet the same. We are all part of Lions International, and benefit from that exposure. However, it is important each club to create news pertaining to its own activities. This can be done quickly and easily, once you have the basics completed.

You need to identify each and every activity your club will be involved in over the course of a year. This list of events should include the actual dates of events, and a time in advance of the event that the media should be notified.

You also must identify the local media that is most likely to use your information in the newspaper, magazine or on television. To accomplish this takes a little research, and a few telephone calls. If you know the newspapers that you want to get information to, read them over, and identify the editors that cover your type of news. The same can be said for television. You can even go to the various media websites, and get current contact information. In most

cases they will tell you how long the release should be, and who to mail or e-mail it to.

Set up a calendar of events, and dates to submit your releases. Take time in advance to gain the details of what you are going to be saying to the media. It's the who, what, where, when, why and how of the event.

You should also use the information that is available from the Lions International Website. There is a wealth of good information that can be tailored to meet your club's needs. They have prepared rough drafts of various releases that pertain to the functions all clubs take part in. You can also gain insight into how to write a good release from reading those International has prepared.

Make sure you know what you want to say and when. Make sure you have a viable list of editors, and news people. And, above all keep the media informed with newsworthy information. Good Luck.

Mayor Papan, City Council Members, as President of the Millbrae Lions club, this is a great honor for me to accept this commendation from the city we love. Millbrae is one of most progressive and beautiful communities on the peninsula. Since Millbrae's was chartered 60 years ago, we have grown into a world trans-



portation hub and a major player in the economic growth of the county. For seventy years, the Millbrae Lions Club has served the needs of the Millbrae community through good and bad times and will continue to hold true to our Lions motto of "We Serve". On behalf of the 77 members of the Millbrae Lions Club and the 44 members of the Millbrae Lions Leo's Club, I want to thank our City Council for the recognition and also thank the citizens of Millbrae who continue to support our efforts to raise the funds that allow us to help the visually and hearing impaired, our young people and our Millbrae Schools.



Spotlight: SF Marina North Beach Lion Romualdo Enriquez

As a young child, I have felt the need to serve our less fortunate brothers and sisters. When I became an optometrist in the Philippines, I started to channel my knowledge towards providing needed services and saw how vision could strongly affect the way a person leads his life. I have joined organizations where I was able to get some support in pursuing the different charities I have engaged in. It was not until I was sponsored into the Lion's Club by Dr. Herman Valle of the SF Host Lion's Club that I felt the full impact of how being a Lion can boost the full potential of your effort to serve.

The Lions Club has provided us with an unlimited source of used eyeglasses that we use for our medical missions. Through these medical missions, we have improved the way of life of many of the less fortunate.

Partnering with other organizations and other clubs has proven to be very effective in expanding our services. For instance, Prevent Blindness of Northern California, where I am a member of the Board of Directors, has strengthened our ability to provide vision services to those in need by providing Lion's Club members with vision screening training and, thus, allowing us to serve a greater number of people.

I have participated in the medical mission for 10 years and each one brings new excitement and experience. There is the excitement of being to help special cases and being able to save a person's vision and the experience of improving treatment techniques. Being a Lion member has enabled me to examine, provide eyeglasses, and administer corrective vision solutions for over 12,000 patients in our missions. One particularly memorable case was with a 75



year old couple. The husband's vision problems were so severe that he was unable to see neither near or far clearly—visually, his world was a blur. After correcting his vision, he looked at his wife and said, "I never knew you were so beautiful." This

patient had never owned a pair of glasses and through our services, we were able to provide him with something precious; the ability to see and appreciate the beauty around him.

We also came across a 28 year old mother of a young baby, who was legally blind. We were able to correct her vision to 20/30. She was thrilled and expressed how grateful she was, as she was now able to work and earn a living for herself and her child.

My most recent medical mission was in Iriga, Bicol, Philippines, and one that provided us with one of our greatest challenges. On the last day of our mission and after we already closed our clinic, a mother with a 6 month old baby suffering from hydrocephalus came in asking to have her baby's eyes examined. Seeing that her baby needed far more attention than she had requested, I sought the help of Dr. Angelo Agudo, and Dr. Mayette Almazan of the Valley Hi Lions of Sacramento & IBAA. Together we raised 30,000 pesos to initiate hydrocephalus treatment.

We have accomplished much in our missions and efforts to serve but none of this would be possible without God's grace, the San Francisco Marina/North Beach Lion's Club, District Governor Maxine Frasier, our partner organizations, and our families, especially my wife, Club Secretary Lion Olivia Enriquez, who has shared my passion through all these years. Thank-you.

Sams is a Life Member of Lions in Sight, Canine Companions, a multiple Melvin Jones, Heller Keller Fellow, has been named Lion of the month more than a dozen

times since joining and Lion of the Year once. He is also a member of Guide Dogs for the Blind, Campaign Sight First I, Hearing Foundation, Points of Light Foundation Honoree, top fund raiser for 22 years in AIDS Walk SF at more than \$250,000. He's also been a top fund raiser in the

Bay Area March of Dimes, WalkAmerica and American Cancer Society's Making Strides Against Breast Cancer for the last 9 years. He thanks the many Lions clubs and individuals who have helped make that possible. As of this December - Lion Steven and his partner David Strickland with their AT&T teams, Lions and friends raised an incredible \$1,000,000 in 2007 alone for the betterment and support of their community.



Dear Fellow Lion,

I want to tell you about an exciting new Lions partnership.

In July 2007, The International Association of Lions Clubs agreed to help the US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) disseminate information about large-scale or pandemic influenza (flu).

This new partnership includes my participation as one of four leaders of national non-profit organizations to appear in advertisements for HHS' awareness campaign, Take the Lead: Pandemic Flu-Working Together to Prepare Now.

Participation in this national public health campaign is

an honor for Lions clubs. This national campaign coincides with our Lions ALERT emergency preparedness program.

Last century, there were three worldwide pandemic flu outbreaks. Millions of people died. Unlike seasonal flu, humans have little - if any - immunity to a pandemic flu virus. It takes several weeks or months for public health officials to identify a pandemic flu virus strain and develop a vaccine.

As community leaders, we can participate in a pro-active pandemic flu plan. Additional information about pandemic flu appears on the HHS Web site:

www.pandemicflu.gov and the United Nations' World Health Organization (WHO) Web site at: **www.who.org**.

Lions from several US communities recently met with HHS representatives to discuss ways to develop pro-active pandemic flu plans. I want to thank these Lions for representing the Association and for eagerly agreeing to help in the development of a pro-active pandemic flu plan.

Thanks to your efforts in cooperation with Lions throughout the world, CSFII has exceeded US\$132 million raised. This is equivalent to saving the sight of more than 22 million people.

For this report, GCs are asked to contact each of their clubs to determine the total funds raised to date for CSFII. The total should include cash pledges already submitted to LCIF as well as funds raised but not yet submitted to LCIF. We are approaching an important milestone in Lions' history and this Worldwide Report may mark the day we surpass our minimum goal of US \$150 million!

Important dates leading up to the February 20th Worldwide Report Day are:

- **February 6** - GCs are asked to submit these results to their DCs. (GC-7 Form)
- **February 8** - DCs are asked to submit the cumulative results of their district to their SCs. (DC-7 Form)
- **February 13** - SCs are asked to submit sector totals to their NMNCs. (SC-7 Form)
- **February 20** - NMNCs call CSFII headquarters to provide their report to Vice Chairperson PIP Moore and myself.

I thank you in advance for your assistance in contacting your clubs and working together to collect these results. Your efforts are directly responsible for our success and will serve to remind all your clubs to do their best for CSFII. With your assistance, we will be able to celebrate our campaign's success and inspire Lions' support during "The Year of CSFII."


