It was Saturday morning, September 18<sup>th</sup> of 2004, when I arrived at an oceanfront with sails amidst soft currents of inspiration and novelty. The current alone battened upon the body of the boats and I was unaware of the slinking brainwave that was crawling slowly to the building I was entering. It was then, within these walls, when I felt it. It was relaxing. And when I entered the room of my destination, I was alone. But it hit me.

Who would have known that in the course of my travels, nothing like this had been exposed to me? What inspiration! How naive I was. How inexperienced. How lonesome without this new drive, this wisdom I had acquired and acquiesced with. To queue it up, I had been on a road of twists and turns, forks and intersection that left me thunderstruck, flabbergasted, and bemused; but rather than randomly turning left and right based on the flip of a coin, I aligned my path, joined the intersections, deleted the forks, and began to walk it. Of course, I have only walked for a few days--not nearly enough to begin to comprehend what is at the end; nonetheless, I have attained an enlightenment of leadership. How coarse my road was! It sickens me to think back on its uneven ground, its revolting surface. But no matter. I have united these broken roads to fit my motives of becoming what I had not thought I would ever wish to be, of what I would never imagine myself becoming: a leader.

Now what makes a leader? Can you answer it? I do not believe so. Of course, anyone can reply with a superficial meaning-- something quick as to simply get the idea out. But what they do not realize is that their answer, no matter how flowery their language, is on the surface. Even my writing of such a subject is fruitless, for leadership is like describing life. You cannot even start to comprehend it. Can you answer me the riddles of death? Can you answer me why we exist? Can you give me a purpose? Well, no more than you can give me an answer to the definition and motives of a leader. The general dictionary definition of a leader is as followed:

"Somebody who guides or directs others by showing them the way or telling them how to behave."

Well let me begin by stating that leaders do not have a pastiche of recommended behaviors sleeping silently in their back pocket. Direction is even ambiguous in meaning. If leaders were to give us direction, we all would be walking down the same road. And with this done, all roads would be straight. No evolution! So what does it truly mean to be a leader? Why should I even go into it, for you all know that I cannot explain it any more than you can grasp the Greek idea of "every sentence in this box is false."



#### AIDS AWARENESS AND DINE AROUND 94114 COMING NOVEMBER 10TH, 2004

The following are two true stories about why we work so hard to halt the AIDS Pandemic:

Flanked by men and women dressed in various forms of leather chaps and other barely-there gear, Troy Brunet walked haltingly down San Francisco's bustling Market Street.

Surrounded by a couple hundred leather enthusiasts and a police escort, the 39-year-old leaned

heavily on a crutch and muscled each step of the way of the two-mile benefit walk through the city's Castro district.



Troy Brunet's body has aged prematurely after being diagnosed with HIV ten years ago. The six-foot-six retired finance director has developed arthritis in his hands and knees. He said his lungs collapsed before falling into a pneumonia-induced coma. He has had three hip replacements, including one just six months ago. And in recent weeks — as if he needed more grief - he developed a stubborn wart on the sole of his foot.

"I'm hurting like nobody's business," said Brunet, dressed conservatively in a leather vest and jeans. "I'm in excruciating pain, but I'm walking because I have to. I'm walking today for everybody else that can't do it. Because one day," he said, "someone's going to be walking for me."

(The LeatherWalk is held each year in July)

#### WALKING FOR ME

About 250 San Francisco leather enthusiasts turned out yesterday for LeatherWalk 2004, an annual fundraiser that benefits AIDS and Breast Cancer patients. Now in its 13th year, the event has grown from about 45 walkers to several hundred. The amount raised each year has also increased, from about \$7,000 to a high of \$32,000 five years ago.

Event organizers said proceeds are split between the AIDS Emergency Fund and the Breast Cancer Emergency Fund. Both San Franciscobased funds pay bills for people with those diseases. The LeatherWalk raised \$18,023 this year, which is about \$2,000 less and 50 people fewer than last year, according to Art Tomaszewski, Leather-Walk's founder. "Part of the decline may be due to poor advertising or apathy among young people toward AIDS, "he said, "But I'm still happy with the turnout".

Aside from its charitable aims, the Walk has an added significance for local leather buffs. It marks the official start of Leather Week, a sevenday countdown to the fun-filled Folsom Street Fair.

Organizers call the event, which takes place on the last Sunday in September in San Francisco's South of Market district, "the world's largest leather celebration." It started to recognize a way to help a hard hit community recognize its terrible health problem, find resources for research, medicines, and help for those suddenly stricken with what was then an automatic death sentence and for which there is still no cure. It grew to embrace a people and a community.

When more became known about Breast Cancer and the terrible price this killer was exacting, with the same lack of resources and emergency aid for those who suddenly found themselves diagnosed with it, the Castro Lions helped to start the fund that is now known as the Breast Cancer Emergency Fund (BCEF) and it is operated along the same lines as AIDS Emergency Fund (AEF). However, as the years passed and we kept doing all these benefits in our community, we realized several things. Our outreach about the impact of these two pandemics was too insular.

The Fairs and the walks were a time to see which old friends were still around and to try make sure we raised more funds, yes, but we need more than this. Thus, Dine Around 94114, something that everyone could participate in, was created. Well, we all love to

#### LIONISM DEDICATED TO ONE PROJECT FOR 15 YEARS

It is hard to refer to a person as a Project, yet this is what happened when Desiree Johnston fell when she was only 18 months old in 1989. The Chamber of Commerce contacted the local service clubs and the Lions responded in a big way. They assumed the responsibility for the years of restorative dental work that would be needed. Desiree's mother was a waitress at Kens Family Restaurant in the Menlo Park area. They held their first fundraiser there, with the proceeds from all of the meals on February 6, 1989, going into this special fund for Desiree Johnston. That first fundraiser raised over \$8.000.00. It has been a commitment lasting over 18 years, in which the Lions have paid in excess of another \$16,000 to supplement the insurance for the rebuilding of the jaw and dental implants. To look at Desiree today, you would never know she had gone through these long years of surgery, either by her cheery demeanor or by her beautiful and sunny appearance. Miss Johnston appeared at the October 27th, 2004 joint meeting of these clubs to thank them for their support and dedication.

As Bill Biggs, PIP, says, "One of the things that makes Lions different from other volunteers is their willingness to commit."

When Lion Dana Biggs spoke to us at the Leadership Seminar on 9/18,in Foster City, for 4-C4, she reminded us of this:

"There is a big difference between interest and commitment. Interest allows for excuses. Commitment means that you are going to get the job done, finish the thing that you started, keep your word." That is Lionism. That is Leadership. <>

This was a fun and educational trip for those Lion members, spouses. and friends on the SightFirst trip that toured Beijing, Xian, and Shanghai during September 13 - 23, 2004. The group of nineteen people, under the quidance and leadership of Lions Club President Macy and Michael Chan, Vision Care Service Foundation Chair Jesse Ling, PDG Larry Wong, PPs and Advisers Barbara Yee and Yvonne Lee had a great and meaningful tour in China. We had come there for a special purpose that our Club had worked very hard on for many months.

Some members later went separately to Quangdong, Hong Kong, Zhuhai and Macau to view some facilities there.

The main purpose and highlight of the trip was a SightFirst China Action Mission, arranged by the Project Head Quarters in Hong Kong and in conjunction with the China Disabled Person's Federation - which oversees the Lions Clubs in special districts in China - to visit the Shaanxi Fraternity (Boai in Chinese) Hospital in Xian.

Prior to the mission the San Francisco Chinatown Lions Club Vision Care Service Foundation had arranged to donate \$5000 towards the purchase of a much needed microscope and a supply of 200 intraocular lenses (IOL) for the use in cataract surgeries. The Chinatown Lions group was welcomed by a large crowd of dignitaries from the local district and CDPF as well as hospital medical staffs, patients, and media people upon arrival.



The Chinese red carpet was rolled out and the formal ceremony was held on a red stage where the SF



Chinatown Lions Club was introduced.



President Macy had an opportunity to speak to the inquisitive audience and of our SightFirst Mission. Also speaking briefly were PDG Larry Wong on the San Francisco Chinatown Lions Club and Lions International. VCSF Chair Jesse Ling, Barbara Yee, and Yvonne Lee spoke on behalf of the Club and Vision Care Service Foundation. It was a very touching, emotional and well received ceremony.

Afterwards, the group had an opportunity to tour the Hospital and meet with some of the patients. I personally, felt the most rewarding and touching moment for the group was when we met a 94 year old patient who had just completed his cataract operations. He and his wife were so happy, there were tears of joy, when entered their room. His wife told us that he could not see for 40 years! Now we, as Lions, had helped bring him the miracle of sight again.



This very special moment is exactly what so many of us have worked so long to help those with sight problems, and we were fortunate enough to be there when it happened. As a result an additional \$2000 dollars were donated by some members of the Club to the hospital. (Continued Pg 12)

## HANUKKAH BEGINS DEC 12—Eight Days of Light

Hanukkah is one of the few Jewish holidays not mentioned in the Bible. The story of how Hanukkah came to be is in the books of the Maccabees (1 & 2) which are not part of the Jewish canon of the Hebrew Bible.

These books tell the story of a small band of Jewish fighters who liberated the land of Israel from the Syrian Greeks who occupied it. By 167 BCE Antiochus IV Epiphanes, the ruler at the time, intensified his campaign to change the Jewish culture by defiling the Temple in Jerusalem and banning Jewish practice. The Maccabees, - led by the 5 sons of the priest Mattathias—waged a 3 year war that culminated in in the cleaning

and rededication of the Temple.

When they regained the Temple, only one consecrated jar of oil for the lamps could be found. This was not enough to burn for the required 8 days for both the cleansing of the Temple and the Festival of Sukkot, which was the last religious festival missed under the occupation. But the jar of oil did burn long enough for the new oil to be made, all 8 days. It was and is to this day, considered a miracle.

The great historian, Josephus Flavius wrote of the account about 250 years after it had occurred and called it The Festival of Lights. It is, however, officially known as Hanukkah which means Dedication

The Talmud relates these stories in the context of a discussion about the fact that for the eight days of Hanukkah, fasting and grieving are not allowed.

Hanukkah found new rise with the advent of Zionism and as Israel is once again feeling the need to fight for national independence and religious freedom, identity and expression on a daily basis in the post Holocaust world.

It seems many religions observe a holiday the recognizes a miracle a light, which represents freedom and knowledge, being restored to the world after a struggle with oppression and darkness.

### **Diwali - HINDU FESTIVAL OF LIGHTS**

Diwali is the Hindu festival welcoming Ram and Sita out of the forest and celebrating the Hindu new year.

Deepvali is the Sanskrit word meaning rows of lights.

Some people light decorated candles, some decorated clay diva lamps, and other decorative lights and put them in their windows for the festival. Deepvali is now shortened to the more well known Diwali.

Often people make their own diva lamps from clay and wrote haiku

on them to celebrate Diwali. A diva lamp has a single wick and is usually brightly colored. They are sometimes shaped like small bowls or ovals with wide opening that are filled with paraffin and a single wick.

Many festivals are celebrated in India, and some of them are celebrated in some parts of the country only. But Diwali is one of the greatest Indian festivals that is celebrated all over India.

Diwali is a huge family festival starting with worship followed by a celebration breakfast. Families dress in new clothes and jewels and go visiting others. They exchange gifts and sweets. It is a time to forget quarrels and make up with people that are no longer friends. At night every building is lit with little lamps in hopes that Lakshmi, the Goddess of wealth will bless them.

The celebration of Diwali lasts for five days. It begins on November 12th this year.



President Macy, Michael, and Jesse also had the opportunity to observe an actual operation where a patient's cataract was removed and replaced with an IOL lens --- it was really quite an experience.



As the District Photographer, Lion Michael captured some of the rare shots and a short video clip was recorded as well.

After we were suitably dressed and went into the operating room, the action began to take place. The surgical team brought the patient in



and began by preparing the eye that was to have a cataract removed and an IOL Lens implanted.

The surgery went quickly and suddenly the surgeon was holding up the cataract that had been causing blindness in the patient. While surgery continued and the IOL Lens was implanted I was able to get a



close up of the cataract. Then this surgery was over and was a success.

Lion President Macy Chan, Lion Jesse Ling and myself, Lion Michael Chan, were in awe of the work that had been done.

We stopped for a moment with the



surgical staff for a picture and to meet the next two patients who were waiting for their eye operations.



In order to get more information for the rest of the Lions around the World, the following data was gathered through the Shaanxi Fraternity Hospital and the SightFirst China Action Team in Hong Kong.

A Cost Breakdown for a paying patient for cataract operation in China is as follows:

Description and Cost in US Dollars

# 1. Eye & Physical Examination: \$60

Eye sight examination, Peripheral examination, Eye pressure check, Retina Examination, Cornea curvature and depth measurement, A/B sight comparison, Brain check/scan, EKG Blood test, and Blood clot timing;

#### 2. Cost of Surgery: \$92

IOL lenses, and the cost of surgery, including the removal of the cataract and the implant of the IOL;

# 3. Hospital Room and Board: (duration not given) \$32

Includes cost of bed and room, and Drugs, and any needed Therapy, etc;

Total cost: \$184

Here are some basic startling cost comparison for your thoughts.

The cost of cataract operations in the US ranges from \$3,000 to \$5,000 Dollars and the same operation in China for the paying patient is around \$184. For the poor individuals with lower incomes, they can apply for free operations and they will be subsidized by the local government and by the LCIF funds.

Cost of one IOL lenses in the US is approximately \$100 and is only \$8 in China – manufactured by a factory joint ventured with an America company.

In the SightFirst Mission in China, here are some facts (Phase I and part of Phase II) that we should all be very proud of as Lions:

- · Completed 2.88 million cataract operations in 31 provinces and cities from July 1997 Dec. 2003.
- Dispatched 260 medical teams to remote and poverty stricken areas to conduct cataract surgeries.
- Established 104 eye clinics in remote counties.
- Trained more then 12,000 ophthalmologists and paramedics.

#### Objectives of SPCA Phase II (July 2002 – June 2007)

- To conduct 2.5 millions cases of cataract sight restoring surgeries. So far 830, 000 cases completed.
- To setup the Aid-The-Poor-Sight Restoring Centers.
- · Organize medical teams for more poor and remote areas.
- Setup county level eye clinics as well as permanent eye centers in local hospitals.
- Further education on eye disease prevention and eye care knowledge promotion of SFCA in China.
- Train local eye doctors, for special services of 12 provinces in the western part of China.
- · Extend the eye disease research zone for long term scientific analysis of cataracts.

- Complete project on cataract free zone in Tibet region.
- · Complete dynamic data management on blindness prevention and policy study to assist the Chinese Government to establish a more efficient infrastructure to execute cataract surgery programs efficiently on their own after 5 years of Phase II project.

#### **Financial Support:**

Phase I: US\$15.38 million from LCIF plus US\$165.48 million from the Chinese Government were granted.

<u>Phase II</u>: US\$15.5 million from LCIF plus US\$251.70 million from the Chinese Government were granted.

San Francisco Chinatown Lions Club has worked many years on Sight First Projects, both in assisting throughout the San Francisco Bay Area through our own Vision Care Service Foundation and its many Health Fairs and Educational Programs and through the efforts of working together with the SightFirst China Action Mission, and with the China Disabled Person's Federation. This was not only a SightFirst Mission that was educational and extremely productive, it was also one that was filled with emotional gratitude in being able to see the joy our work has helped to bring about. It is so good to be Lion helping the world to see.

Hometown Day: Be a Child's Hometown Hero

Hometown Day, the first Wednesday in December, is another opportunity for Lions and LensCrafters to work side by side to provide the Gift of Sight to those in greatest need. This year, Hometown Day will fall on December 1.

LensCrafters stores open their doors early on Hometown Day to donate eye exams to schoolchildren. Lions pre-screen children to ensure recipients meet qualifications for the free exams. Clubs can participate by providing transportation, aiding LensCrafters employees and planning the day's logistics. Since Hometown Day's began in Sacramento, California in 1993, more than 163,000 children have been helped.

The Price Hill Lions Club in Cincinnati, Ohio, has been actively involved in Hometown Day since its' beginning. Price Hill Lions work with LensCrafters to screen 15-20 children each year. Lions contact the principals at four Catholic parishes to obtain a list of students who qualify for free lunches. This list is the club's means for pre-screening students to ensure they qualify for the free exam. Lions pick-up the students from school and transport them to the store. Once the screenings are complete, they buy the children lunch at McDonald's and then drive them back to school.

David Dornheggen, club secretary, said Hometown Day presents an excellent opportunity to fulfill a community need. "There are pretty substantial needs in the area, and through Hometown Day, we can hit on two of our club's main focal points: vision projects and aiding children," he said.

For those clubs wishing to become involved this year, Darnheggen suggests establishing personal contact with local school principals. "Principals are always willing to get involved when the project will directly assist the children at their school," he says. On the east side of Cincinnati, Lion John Tolos contacts 11 public schools in two school districts and coordinates transportation to and from three local stores. By working with several local stores, Tolos and LensCrafters provide vision screenings for 40 children annually on Hometown Day. Tolos has also been actively involved in the day's festivities since 1993.

"The stores are very gracious," said Tolos, who points out that LensCrafters stores offer snacks and plenty of entertainment, such as movies and games, to keep the children occupied while waiting their turn. In recent years, sports celebrities from the Mighty Ducks minor league hockey team and Cincinnati Bengals NFL football team have visited with the children while at the stores.

The Eastgate Mall LensCrafters store is one of several LensCrafters stores in the Cincinnati area that partner with local Lions clubs for Hometown Day. Sarah Pierce, LensCrafters associate, emphasizes the importance of the Lions/LensCrafters teamwork. "Hometown Day is an awesome program where we can aid people in the local community. It is important that Lions and LensCrafters work as a team, for we both ultimately have the same goals—to improve the vision of adults and children. We want to help as many people as we can to see better, and together we can assist many more individuals."

Pierce points out that last year four schools contacted her to provide assistance on Hometown Day, and she was only able to coordinate screenings at two of the schools. She says if she would've had more volunteers, she could've helped one or two more schools.
